### Governor Sisolak Unveils Roadmap to Recovery Most Businesses Can Reopen by May 15th, County to Play Key Role

On April 30th, Governor Steve Sisolak unveiled his "Nevada United Roadmap to Recovery," a phased plan for reopening Nevada's economy as we continue to fight the COVID-19 pandemic. The core guiding principle of the Governor's plan is that the Nevada's efforts should be "federally supported, state managed, and locally executed." As part of the plan, the Clark County Commission will play a central role In collaborating with the Governor on how and when to phase in reopening.

### **CURRENT PHASE: Stay Home for Nevada**

**Summary:** Implement aggressive community mitigation, increase access to diagnostic testing, increase public health and medical system capacities. **Potential Duration:** Eased flexibility for recreation, retail establishments, and church services, likely lasting through May 15, 2020.

### **PHASE 1: Battle Born Beginning**

**Summary:** May open 1) outdoor spaces, 2) small businesses, and 3) select retail, under strict social distancing measures, hygiene, and occupancy controls. No social events or public gatherings over 10. Strongly encourage improvised face coverings use by all.

**Potential Duration:** Anticipated evaluation period based upon metrics for an estimated 2-3 weeks.

#### **PHASE 2: Silver State Stabilization**

**Summary:** Broader opening of Commerce/Retail, services, and public life under extremely strict social distancing measures, hygiene, and occupancy controls.

**Potential Duration:** Minimum of 2-3 weeks needed to assess and evaluate data and trends throughout phase.

Additional phases of the Roadmap to Recovery plan will focus on limiting additional outbreaks of COVID-19 and longer-term economic recovery efforts.



## Commissioner Jones Serves Health Care Workers, Food Bank

During the COVID-19 crisis, Commissioner Jones has been active serving those on the front lines, as well as those most in need. Jones joined Senator Marilyn Dondero Loop and Assemblyman Steve Yeager to deliver Capriotti's sandwiches to health care workers at 11 UMC facilities across the valley. Jones has also supported the Vegas Community Pantry, run by District F resident Annette Magnus out of her garage, with donations of food and supplies, as well as making deliveries to needy families.

## Have You Been Counted?

### Census Critical to Ensure Nevada Gets Its Fair Share

Every ten years, the U.S. Census counts on our responses to calculate questionnaire to the distribution of federal funds to states. Every year, the federal government allocates more than \$600 billion to states based on these Census figures. This funding supports our schools, health housing, care and transportation services here in Southern Nevada.

For example, right now, the federal government is doling out billions of dollars in disaster relief and other funds to states due to the COVID-19 outbreak based on data from the 2010 Census. A one percent undercount of our Nevada residents could cost us more than \$17 million in funding every year.

#### WHO GETS COUNTED?

**Everyone!** That's right, every person who was living in the U.S. as of April 1st gets counted as part of the Census. So whether you were born and raised in Nevada, or you're from another country, if you are living in Nevada now, you are counted on the Census. And don't forget the kids – they get counted too!

### **HOW DO YOU GET COUNTED?**

In 2020, for the first time ever, the Census is available online. It's only 9 questions and you can fill it out for you and your family in less than 10 minutes. More than 50% of Nevadans have already filled out their census forms <u>online</u>.
