Hello District G Residents,

As you are probably aware from the media, there are protests happening across our nation, including on our own Las Vegas Strip and Downtown communities, as a result of last week's senseless death of George Floyd in Minneapolis, Minnesota. I am in full support to all the peaceful protests that have occurred in Southern Nevada during the last few days. Please know that Clark County and LVMPD support your constitutional right to protest and we understand why our community members are so passionate about the social issues that are at the center of these protests. My hope is that as you protest, you obey the laws that keep us safe. It is in everyone's best interest, especially as our businesses start to reopen, that we respect private property, respect our public streets, respect our law enforcement officers, and most of all, respect each other. Please let's not forget that while you are participating in these peaceful protests, that you remain aware of all of the safety precautions due to the continued risks of the COVID-19 virus. Please know that I, along with the entire Board of County Commissioners, hear our community's outcry for justice and equality for everyone. One of my top priorities is assisting small businesses that are faced with economic difficulties brought on by COVID-19. I am pleased to announce that earlier this week the Board of County Commissioners voted to approve three grant programs to help small businesses recover and reopen. In this week's newsletter, please read about Clark County's Small Business Stabilization Grant, Small Business Protective Retrofit Grant and Business Small Rental Assistance Program. # Clark County Commissioners Support Aid for 2,800-plus Small Businesses Affected by Coronavirus

The Clark County Commission supported creating three economic development grant programs that could help more than 2,800 local small businesses recover from financial hardships brought on by coronavirus-related restrictions.

Qualifying businesses may receive help for a variety of expenses including, but not limited to, paying rent, utilities or payroll, or for virus-related improvements such as installing additional hand-washing stations, no-touch doors and walk-up windows. Restrictions and requirements vary slightly for each program but all of them require participating businesses be based in Clark County, have a local business license and have 20 or fewer employees. (These grant programs are not available to businesses within the City of Las Vegas as the city was the other local government here that also received funds from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act.)

Combined, the County grant programs are expected to provide more than \$19 million to local businesses through individual grants up to \$5,000 or \$10,000 each.

"Some small businesses have been hit especially hard by the coronavirus," Commissioner Justin Jones said. "These programs will help local businesses stabilize their finances and stay open."

The three grant programs are the Small Business Stabilization Grant, the Small Business Rental Assistance program, and the Small Business Protective Retrofit Grant. Applications for the Small Business Stabilization Grant will be available soon on the County's website, and applications for the other programs will be online by the end of June.

The Small Business Stabilization Grant will provide up to \$5,000 or \$10,000, depending upon how many employees the business has, to help cover costs such as rent, utilities, inventory, payroll and other expenses. Businesses that apply for and receive a Stabilization Grant will not be allowed to receive funding from the other two grant programs.

The Small Business Rental Assistance program will provide up to \$10,000 to cover past-due rent. The money would be paid directly to the landlord.

The Small Business Protective Retrofit Grant will reimburse businesses up to \$5,000 for costs such as purchasing personal protective equipment for employees and installing no-touch doors and walk-up windows.

The funding for the grant programs comes from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. Additional announcements will be coming regarding the application processes and deadlines. Grant awards could be made in July.

# Clark County to Offer Small Business Stabilization Grant

Clark County understands the challenges that many small businesses currently face. As an integral part of our community we want to support small businesses financially impacted by closures or restrictions related to COVID-19. For businesses operating within Clark County we have developed a business support grant using federal CARES Act Relief Funds.

**Grant Award:** up to \$10,000 5-20 employees  
up to \$5,000 1-4 employees

**Grant Uses:** Working Capital (rent, utilities, inventory, payroll, license fees, etc.)

- Must have 20 or less full-time employees as of March 15, 2020
  - (sole proprietor and home-based business are eligible)
- Must have an active business license in Clark County or respective jurisdiction
- Must not have received any federal loans or grant dollars (SBA EIDL, PPP, etc.)
- Must not have received or anticipate receiving grant dollars from an incorporated city
  - Henderson, North Las Vegas, Boulder City, Mesquite
- Must have been in business for at least 6-months prior to March 15, 2020
- Must have an actual financial hardship (financial statements from previous 6 months will be reviewed)
- Must not have any federal, state or county tax liens

## Clark County to Offer Small Business Protective Retrofit Grant

For Clark County the health and safety of our community is a top priority. With COVID-19 creating a new normal, having a healthy community and thriving economy requires businesses to make adjustments to their operations. In order to ensure the safety of customers and employees, business operators must promote and support social distancing and vigilant cleaning. Clark County recognizes that installing new safety equipment, modifying existing facilities and purchasing required PPE or screening tools can be an unexpected, but necessary, new expense. We want to help small businesses keep themselves and the rest of the community safe by providing small businesses operating Clark County a reimbursement grant to cover the cost of required new operating models.

**Grant Award:** up to \$5,000 (based on actual costs)

**Grant Uses:** Reimbursement for costs associated with

- Facility modifications (Install plexiglass, hand washing stations, no-touch doors, walk-up windows, etc.)
- One-time purchase of PPE (masks, gloves, hand sanitizer, disinfectant wipes, etc.)
- One-time purchase of screening tools (thermometers, screening software, thermal cameras, etc.)
- One-time purchase of training (training materials, training software, training services or consultants)

**Eligibility Requirements:**

- Must have 20 or less full-time employees as of March 15, 2020 (sole proprietor eligible)
- Must not have received any federal loans or grant dollars (SBA EIDL, PPP, etc.)
- Must not have received any funds from the Clark County Small Business Stabilization Grant
- Must not have received or anticipate receiving grant dollars from an incorporated city
  - Henderson, North Las Vegas, Boulder City, Mesquite
- Must have an active business license in Clark County or respective jurisdiction
- Must have a physical commercial location (no home-based businesses)
- Must have been in business no later than March 1, 2020
- Must have a qualified business modification or expenditure no earlier than March 15, 2020
- Must not have any federal, state or county tax liens

## Clark County to Offer Small Business Rental Assistance

During recent emergency orders put in place by Nevada Governor, Steve Sisolak, a number of businesses were forced to close or limit operations. These restrictions and closures made it difficult for businesses to generate the revenue needed to cover existing obligations. Many businesses were forced to make hard decisions on what bills to pay. Paying rent was generally at the bottom of most lists and often became the first casualty. Many tenants and landlords worked together to outline rent deferral plans, but deferments still leave a debt obligation which may be difficult for small businesses to overcome during these challenging times. Clark County understands that commercial rent payments play two roles within our economy; 1) keeping the paying business open and in its operating space and 2) supporting the landlord's ability to make the space available as a building owner. Clark County has developed a commercial rental assistance program to help tenants stay in place and help landlords keep tenants. Commercial tenants, in conjunction with their landlords, operating within Clark County now have access to grant dollars to cover up to \$10,000 in back rent.

**Grant Award:** up to \$10,000 (actual rent arrears)

**Grant Uses:** Payment of past due rent direct to the landlord

# Governor Sisolak Adjusts Travel Advisory for Nevada as the State Enters Phase 2

On the first official day of Phase 2, Nevada Governor Steve Sisolak adjusted a previous travel advisory for the State of Nevada effective immediately.

Nevada continues to strongly discourage those who have tested positive for COVID-19 and have not yet recovered, those who have been presumptively diagnosed with COVID-19, and those who are exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms from traveling to the State at this time.

Additionally, Nevada recommends all travelers review CDC travel guidelines, including restriction on travelers from certain foreign countries from entering the United States.

“Nevada is entering Phase 2 of reopening and our gaming properties are on track to reopen as of June 4, as we gradually and cautiously return to a new normal, while continuing to take strong mitigation measures against COVID-19,” said Gov. Sisolak. “Nevada is a premier travel destination, and will always be a warm and welcoming spot for visitors. We have strong systems in place to help protect Nevadans and our visitors, but continue to urge all those who have tested positive and not yet recovered or who are exhibiting symptoms to avoid travel to the State at this time. We look forward to welcoming back all of the tourists who love Nevada as much as we do in the safest and most responsible way possible.”

If you travel to Nevada, protect yourself and others during your trip by following CDC guidelines:

1. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth.
2. Avoid close contact with others.
3. Keep 6 feet of physical distance from others.
4. Wear a face covering in public.
5. Cover coughs and sneezes.

If you are traveling in Nevada and are experiencing symptoms (fever, cough, shortness of breath):

1. Continue to stay in your designated quarantine location, avoid contact with others, and contact a healthcare provider for further instructions on treatment or testing.
2. If you are older or have any medical conditions (e.g., immune compromise, diabetes, asthma), consult your regular healthcare provider.
3. If you feel you need medical care, call ahead before you go in and inform them of your travel history.
4. If you need urgent medical care (e.g., have difficulty breathing), call 9-1-1 and let the dispatcher know your travel history). For more information, visit [nvhealthresponse.nv.gov](https://www.nvhealthresponse.nv.gov).

# Henderson “Spaghetti Bowl” Evening Ramp Closure, Upgrade June 4

The Nevada Department of Transportation (NDOT) will close the eastbound 215 Beltway ramp to northbound U.S. Highway 95 from 9 p.m., June 4, until 5 a.m., June 5, in Henderson. The temporary ramp closure is needed to install loop detectors used for recording traffic counts. MC4 is the general contractor.

Motorists should use caution while travelling through the work zone, heed construction signage, and take alternate detour routes, if possible. NDOT works with Waze to inform the public about planned highway restrictions, but unscheduled construction changes, closures and restrictions are possible due to weather or other factors. For the latest state highway conditions, visit [nroads.com](http://nroads.com) or call 511 before driving.

NDOT and its contractors continue vital highway construction and maintenance activities upkeeping Nevada’s transportation system for essential travel and supply chain deliveries. The department actively practices COVID-19-related public health and safety protocols, including social distancing of six feet or more and restricting groups to 10 or less, thereby keeping our team, families and communities safe and connected.



# Maryland Parkway Corridor Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) Plan Online Community Survey

# 2020 Census - Let's Get Our Fair Share, Nevada

Every ten years, the US Census counts on our responses to distribute federal funds to states. This outside funding supports vital services for Nevada children, including health insurance programs, hospitals, child care, food assistance, schools and early childhood development programs.

CHILDREN UNDER FIVE ARE THE MOST UNDERCOUNTED OF ALL NEVADANS. If you have children in your home, make sure they are counted.

- Count children in the home where they live and sleep most of the time, even if their parents do not live there.
- If you've just had a baby, and your baby is still in the hospital on Census Day (April 1, 2020), then count your baby at the home where he or she will live and sleep most of the time.
- If children spend time in more than one home, count them where they stay most often. If their time is evenly divided, or if you do not know where they stay most often, count them where they are staying on April 1, 2020.
- If you are helping to take care of a friend's or family member's child, and the child does not have a permanent place to live, count the child if he or she is staying with you on April 1, 2020 - even if it's only temporary.

# Nevada Health Response Website Adds Testing Locator Map

As Nevada moves into Phase 2 of its reopening of businesses and social activities statewide, testing for COVID-19 is an important tool for health officials and professionals who are working hard to ensure that anyone who needs a test can get one.

To help Nevadans find testing in their areas, the Nevada Health Response website now features a search tool with locations, dates and other information that residents can use to arrange getting tested in their area. The tool can be accessed directly at <https://nvhealthresponse.nv.gov/find-covid-19-testing-in-nevada/>.

"Getting a test in Nevada is quick, easy and painless. Nevada has done tremendous work to increase testing capacity statewide and this tool helps bring all the information into one place for Nevadans" said Gov. Steve Sisolak. "I encourage all Nevadans to take advantage of this new tool to find a testing location nearby."

COVID-19 data and test results that include people who don't show symptoms ("asymptomatic") can provide a more accurate understanding of how the virus is spreading. Identifying asymptomatic cases will provide a better understanding of the virus's impacts on communities.

Expanding testing plays a major part in influencing the state's continuous adjustment of prevention and control measures. Additional testing can also lead to a larger number of Nevadans being made aware of their conditions, knowledge that could contribute to focused social distancing and further slowing community transmissions.

Individuals who need help accessing the online locator's content are encouraged to call Nevada 2-1-1 for more information. While testing criteria for coronavirus disease (COVID-19) have been expanded in Nevada to include individuals with and without symptoms, each testing site has its own criteria, which is indicated in the online locator's results.

# JUNE 9, 2020, PRIMARY ELECTION NOTICE OF ALL-MAIL BALLOT ELECTION

## OVERVIEW

To help keep you, your family, and our community safer by limiting interactions that could spread the coronavirus, the June 9, 2020, Primary Election is being conducted entirely by mail ballot. On or before May 18, 2020, Clark County registered voters will receive a mail ballot packet from the Clark County Election Department which will include:

- A ballot and instructions for voting a mail ballot;
- A pre-addressed, postage-paid envelope that must be used for returning voted mail ballots; and
- A list of mail ballot drop-off sites for voters to drop off their own voted mail ballot in-person, if they are unable to put their ballot in the mail.

Registered Voters who do not receive their packet by May 18, 2020, should contact us at (702) 455-VOTE (8683). We *STRONGLY ENCOURAGE VOTERS TO MAIL THEIR BALLOT* rather than drop it off in-person. Please read this entire notice for important details.

## CONTACT INFORMATION WILL HELP US ASSIST VOTERS

We strongly encourage all voters who do not have their current e-mail or phone number listed in their registration records to contact us as soon as possible and no later than **MAY 12, 2020**, to provide that information. This is important because if a mail ballot has no signature on the envelope, or if the signature does not match the one the Election Department has on file, we will need to contact the voter as soon as possible to resolve this issue. To check if your phone number or e-mail is in your voter registration records or to add it if it is not:

Please note that NRS 293.558 requires the Clark County Election Department to keep your e-mail address CONFIDENTIAL. Meaning, it may not be given to third parties.



## CLOSE OF STANDARD REGISTRATION

The deadlines to register to vote or update existing voter registration by mail or online in time for the June 9, 2020, Primary Election and still receive a regular mail ballot are below. After those dates pass, voters who wish to register to vote or make changes to their existing voter registration will have to do so through the same-day registration or same-day updates process, either online or in-person. Those voters may only vote a paper provisional mail ballot in-person on the spot at the Clark County Election Department and will need to show current, valid identification, and, if needed, proof of residency. See "Same Day Registration and Same-Day Updates of Existing Registration" starting on page 5 for more information. We strongly urge voters to register to vote or to make any necessary updates as soon as possible so they may avoid having to go to the Election Department offices.

- **May 12, 2020**, is the last day to register to vote or update your existing voter registration by mail for the June 9, 2020, Primary Election.
- **May 21, 2020**, is the last day to register to vote or update your existing registration on the Secretary of State's website at [www.registertovotenv.gov](http://www.registertovotenv.gov).

## RETURNING YOUR VOTED MAIL BALLOT

The Clark County Election Department will process and count voted mail ballots that are returned in the envelope provided, but only if the outside of the envelope is signed by the voter. This is required for verification purposes.

The ballots must be submitted and received in one of the following ways:

- Mailed Through the U.S. Post Office: We *STRONGLY ENCOURAGE VOTERS TO RETURN THEIR VOTED MAIL BALLOT THROUGH THE U.S. POST OFFICE* rather than drop it off in-person. To send it by postal mail, voters must:
  - Seal their voted mail ballot in the pre-addressed, postage-paid, return envelope included in the packet they will receive.
  - Sign the outside of the envelope in the space provided for their signature.
  - Make sure their signed envelope is postmarked by June 9, 2020. Note that we must receive properly postmarked ballots by 5:00 p.m. on June 16, 2020, (7 days after the Election Day) for them to be counted.
- Dropped-Off In-Person: Voters may also drop off their own voted mail ballot, but only at one of the locations in the schedules on pages 3-5 during the listed dates and hours. To do this, voters must:
  - Seal their voted mail ballot in the return envelope included in the packet they will receive.
  - Sign the outside of the envelope in the space provided for their signature.
  - Drop off their voted mail ballot no later than 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.

**Online Registration and Updates:** If you could not register to vote or update your existing voter registration by mail by May 12, 2020, you still may do so through the Secretary of State's website at [www.registertovotenv.gov](http://www.registertovotenv.gov) through June 4, 2020 (Thursday).

- **May 13 to May 21:** If you register to vote or update your existing registration online between May 13 (Wednesday) and May 21, 2020, (Thursday), within about a week you will receive a regular mail ballot with your updated name, precinct, party, etc., as applicable.
- **May 22 to June 4 (Online Same-Day Registration and Same-Day Updates):** If you register to vote or update your existing registration online between May 22 (Friday) and June 4, 2020 (Thursday), you may only vote a paper PROVISIONAL MAIL BALLOT IN-PERSON AT THE CLARK COUNTY ELECTION DEPARTMENT, WHICH YOU MUST IMMEDIATELY TURN IN. You may not take your ballot out of the building. You must also show acceptable identification and, if needed, proof of residency. See page 6 for details on identification and provisional ballot voting. The address is 965 Trade Dr., Suite F, North Las Vegas, NV. The dates for in-person voting are May 23 (Saturday) to June 5 (Friday) and also on June 9 (Tuesday). See page 7 for the "In-Person Voting Location and Schedule," including hours and a map.



**Identification and Proof of Residency:** If you register to vote or update your existing voter registration online from May 22 to June 4, or in-person from May 23 to June 5 or on June 9, you must provide identification and, if needed, proof of residency, to vote a paper provisional mail ballot in-person on the spot at the Clark County Election Department. The identification requirements are:

- Your unexpired Nevada (NV) Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Driver's License with your current residential address which must match the address in your registration; or
- Your unexpired NV State Identification Card with your current residential address, which must match the address in your registration; or
- Your NV DMV temporary "Interim Document" with your current residential address, which must match the address in your voter registration.
- **IF** the address on your identification is not your current residential address, meaning it does not match your voter registration residential address and/or if it is not where you currently live, then you must also provide proof of current residency, such as:
  - A military identification card; or
  - A utility bill (electric, gas, oil, water, sewer, septic, phone, cable); or
  - A bank or credit union statement; or
  - A paycheck; or
  - An income tax return; or
  - A mortgage statement, or residential rental or lease agreement; or
  - A motor vehicle registration; or
  - A property tax statement; or
  - Any other document issued by a governmental agency.

**Paper Provisional Mail Ballot Overview and Verification Process:** If you register to vote or update your voter registration either online from May 22 to June 4, or in-person from May 23 to June 5 or on June 9, you may only vote a paper provisional mail ballot by appearing in-person at the Clark County Election Department and voting on the spot. You must also provide the identification indicated above. Your paper provisional mail ballot will have all of the contests and candidates that are on a regular ballot. It will differ from a regular ballot in that it will be counted only after verification that:

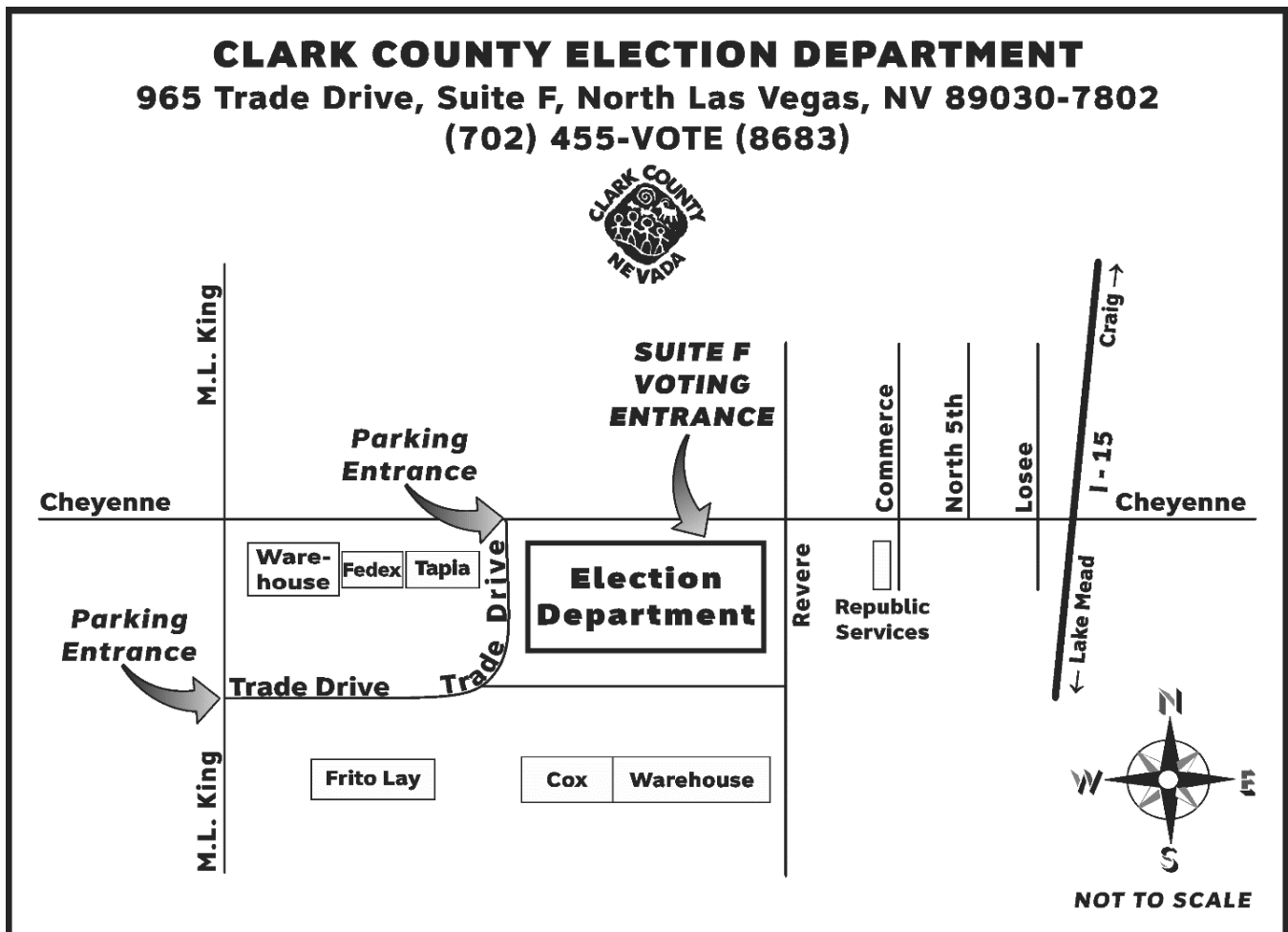
- You were qualified to cast a ballot in the current election;
- You did not cast multiple ballots in the same election;
- You showed acceptable identification when you voted (see above); and
- **IF** needed, you provided acceptable proof of residency (see above).

In-Person Same-Day Registration and Updates, May 23-June 5 and on June 9: If you could not register to vote or update your existing voter registration by mail by May 12, 2020, or online by May 21, you may do so in-person and vote a paper provisional mail ballot on the spot at the Clark County Election Department from May 23 (Saturday) to June 5, 2020 (Friday), or on June 9, 2020 (Tuesday, Primary Election Day). You may not take your ballot out of the building and you must turn it in immediately. You must show acceptable identification and, if needed, proof of residency. See page 6 for details on identification and provisional ballot voting. The address is 965 Trade Dr., Suite F, North Las Vegas, NV. - Voters who register to vote by mail by May 12, 2020, or online by May 21, 2020, may call the County Election Department at (702) 455-VOTE (8683) to request an electronic ballot.
- Unassisted and private in-person voting will be available at the Election Department. The location, dates, and times will be the same as for "In-Person Voting" (see page 7).

## VOTING IN THE NOVEMBER 3 GENERAL ELECTION

At this time, we expect to return to in-person voting for the November 3, 2020, General Election. If that occurs, voters who had not previously requested to receive mail ballots for every election, which is most voters, will be expected to vote at regular polling places.
