
Plan Your Fall Visit To The Desert National Wildlife Refuge


While a visit to the Desert National Wildlife Refuge is always interesting, the cooler autumn weather and the programs being offered this month make the trip even more enticing. Information about both programs is listed below, or you can find out more at www.fws.gov/refuge/desert

While you are there, be on the lookout for the Striped Meadowhawk (Sympetrum pallipes). On July 27, 2017, refuge visitor & volunteer Neil McDonal observed and photographed a male Striped Meadowhawk along the Coyote Loop near the orchard and stream. This may be the first confirmed record for this species of dragonfly in Clark County! Then, on July 31st, refuge volunteer Jeanne Tinsman



went looking for the dragonfly and found a female of the same species! Striped Meadowhawks prefer habitats such as temporarily flooded marshes, ponds, lakes, and vegetated streams. They will lay their eggs over dry grassy basins; rain then washes the eggs into appropriate habitats for the larva to develop and grow. Letter from the Editor: One Horse Can Change Your Life

I have been horse crazy my entire life. I think it is in my DNA. My mom was a barrel racer and rodeo queen in Iowa and I loved to hear stories about her horse, Silver. Growing up, everything I did revolved around horses – the decorations in my childhood bedroom, art projects, high school essays, the books I read, and all of my hopes and dreams. However, for all of my passion, I had very little interaction with horses. I rode a handful of times – and the majority of those were on paid trail rides.

All of that changed 4 years ago. At a CAC meeting in Sandy Valley they announced that a new Play Day Series was beginning. All I knew was that it involved horses and I wanted to be a part of it. For the first 2 competitions, I was lucky enough to share my friend's horse, Apache. Without ever having a lesson and very few actual rides under my belt, I mounted up and rode out into the arena as if I had been riding my whole life. Thank goodness Apache knew what he was doing! For the 3rd competition, Apache wasn't able to make the trip down to Sandy Valley anymore, so I found myself without a horse to ride. Another friend said that she had a "spunky mare named Zanadee" for me to ride. When I showed up to ride Zanadee that first time, I had no idea that I was meeting the horse that would change the course of my life.

As we rode into the arena for the first event, Zanadee took off! She had been trained in roping and barrel racing, so she set out to do her job. I held on for dear life and managed to stay in the saddle for each event. At the end of the day, I was a mixture of exhaustion and exhilaration. As several of us stood around talking, Zanadee lowered her head and pushed it into my chest and just let me love on her. Her owner was astounded because, as I would come to find out, that was very uncharacteristic of her. I think in that moment she knew she had found her person and within the next month, she became my horse.

For months, I was hardly able to be near Zanadee without overflowing with tears of joy. I owned a horse! I was fulfilling a lifelong dream! She was definitely as spunky, as well as athletic, ornery, stubborn at times, funny, and completely reliable. I trusted her with my life every time I mounted up and in return, she took care of me. The few times that I fell off (all of which were rider error) she never left my side. As I progressed with my riding skills and confidence, she was right there with me. Eventually, my husband began riding, too, and our horse adventures expanded. We went horse camping in Lovell Canyon and Pine Valley, trail riding with the Back Country Horsemen in Red Rock and Valley of Fire, running up sand dunes and crossing washes, competing in Play Days and obstacle challenges, riding in parades, ranch sorting, winning ribbons and buckles, and

dressing up in Halloween costumes. Perhaps our best trip was to southern Utah where we rode in the back country of Zion National Park. Zanadee and my husband's mare, Chevy, took us on a day long, amazing ride across streams and through grassy meadows.

Naturally, we introduced our grandkids to riding, and Zanadee taught them both to love horses and riding. Even though they started young and inexperienced, I never had a moment of doubt that my big, chestnut mare would take care of them.

In the summer of 2016, we decided that we were ready to make a move to the country where we could have our horses right in our back door. We bought our little ranch down in Sandy Valley and the first thing we did was build the stalls for the horses. Bringing them home that first day was one of the happiest moments of my life. It was amazing to look out my kitchen window and see the horses doing all their horsey stuff. Eventually, our herd grew and we were the lucky owners of 5 beautiful horses.

Late last fall, Zanadee started to show weakness and stiffness in her back legs. We tried exercise, stall rest, anti-inflammatories, steroid injections – everything we could think of. The vet took x-rays, but there wasn't anything specifically wrong. Zanadee turned 24 this spring, and although I knew she was old, I thought we would find that right treatment that would help, so we kept trying.

The first time we discovered her laying down and unable to get up, it was heartbreaking. But, with the help of my husband and a friend, we were able to help her get back on her feet. Since that first time, she had struggled with getting up several times over the next months, but we were always able to help her. On the morning of September 16th, my husband looked out the window and saw that Zanadee was down in her stall. It looked like she had probably been down most of the night. Along with the help of a friend, we tried for 3 hours to get her up. I realized that it was time for me to let her go. She had always been a very proud, dignified mare and this was no longer a dignified existence for her. Surrounded by a group of amazing friends, I said goodbye.

Although I am still struggling with the grief and find myself dissolving into tears at unexpected moments, I am so thankful. Thankful that I had the chance to know and love her. Thankful for all of the amazing adventures she accompanied me on. Thankful for the confidence she helped me to find. Thankful that she introduced my grandkids to the wonderful world of horses. Thankful for all of the people she brought into my life. Thankful that I now know the incredible feeling of moving through the world with the wind in my hair and hoof prints behind me.
