## Valley Electric's Golden Goose Shines at 4th of July Parade

One of the most eye-catching entries in Sandy Valley 4th of July Parade this year was "The Golden Goose" -Valley Electric's restored 1943 Chevy Earth Auger Truck. The truck was originally used by the Signal Corps in World War II to reset poles and wires in Europe. After the war, it was brought back to the US and used by Amargosa Valley Power in Amargosa and Beatty. When Amargosa Valley Power and Valley Electric Associate merged in 1965, it was the co-op's first mechanized power pole digger truck. Eventually retired from power company service, it went to work digging fence post holes on a ranch in Utah for many years. After being retired again, the truck sat on the ranch for a decade until it was donated to the Pahrump Valley Museum where it sat for another decade. Top Notch Repairs in Pahrump performed a complete restoration, salvaging 95% of the truck's original components, including the beautiful wood steering wheel. The artists at Top Notch refabricated some isolated trim pieces and tail lights and completely stripped the truck to do a top to bottom restoration. This bright orange truck with so much history was a great addition to this year's parade.



# "Double Negative" Land Art

The "Seven Magic Mountains" art installation north of Jean along Las Vegas Blvd. has become a popular stop for tourists and art enthusiasts, but there is a lesser known example of land art that has existed in Moapa Valley on Mormon Mesa. In 1969, artist Michael Heizer conceived and designed the massive piece of artwork called "Double Negative."

Under the direction of Heizer, 244,000 tons of rock, mostly rhyolite and sandstone, were displaced by local Bryant Robison and 2 of his helpers. This created 2 trenches that are each 30' wide, 50' deep, and 1500' long. The excavated material was dumped into a natural canyon, and the two trenches straddle either side of this canyon. Per Wikipedia, the "negative" in the title thus refers in part to both the natural and man-made negative space that constitutes the work. The work essentially consists of what is not there, what has been displaced.

The project was funded by Art Dealer Virginia Dwan, when she purchased the 60 acre site for Double Negative. Heizer then transferred property deeds to Dawn. The Dwan Gallery tried to sell the work in 1971, but Heizer stopped that from happening. Instead of selling it, Dwan donated Double Negative to the Museum of Contemporary Art in Los Angeles, in 1984. Included in the agreement between Heizer and the Museum is their agreement that they will not undertake any conservation of the piece, as Heizer wishes to have nature reclaim the land through weather and erosion.

Double Negative is located in Moapa Valley and can be accessed via unpaved and unimproved road, 4 wheel drive and/or off road vehicles are recommended. 



# Rocky's Road: Journey of an Orphaned Burro


Rocky has had an eventful couple of months. At the end of June, he received his freeze brand. Freeze branding is the way each horse and burro that has been captured from the wild can be identified. The freeze branding process is pretty simple. The left side of the neck is shaved and washed with alcohol, and then the brand is applied with an iron that is chilled in liquid nitrogen. It isn't painful, but Rocky was definitely not happy to be manhandled and made to stand still! The hair at the site of the mark will grow back white so his brand will be visible – although Rocky's mane flops to the left side, so it is kept hidden most of the time.


The brand is made up of a series of shapes from the International Alpha Angle System. It indicates the Registering Organization (U.S. Government), his year of birth, the area where he was born, and his registration number. Rocky's brand looks like this:




Wild horses and burros are also described using a signalment key. Rocky's signalment key is BG1AAAAAG. He is a burro – B. He is a gelding – G. He has one whorl on his forehead – 1. He has no white anywhere on him – AAAAA. And, he is gray – G. All of the letters and descriptions are in the chart below to the right. Because the descriptions are used for both horses and burros, some of the items are used more often when describing horses. Although, a burro would be pretty cute with white socks!

Rocky can be described by all of those letters, numbers, and symbols – but to us, he is just our sweet, ornery, goofy boy! Rocky has recently received a much needed haircut to help with his shedding and has been "helping" out with lots of chores around the ranch. I'll tell you more about it in next month's newsletter.
