

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New Year's Traditions from Around the World

Drinking champagne, midnight kisses and counting down to the ball drop seem downright boring compared to the New Year's traditions in other parts of the world. Although we didn't specifically wish our horses, burro and goats Happy New Year like they do in Belgium and Romania, we did celebrate the day with a chilly, beautiful 10 mile trail ride

Denmark: As a sign of friendship, people break their old dishes on each other's front doors. Residents will allow the broken dishes to pile up in order to show who has the most friends. In Denmark, people also jump off of chairs in unison at midnight to symbolize jumping forward into the New Year and leaving bad things behind.

Spain: Spain's New Year's food tradition requires that people eat 12 grapes at midnight on New Year's Eve – one for each time the clock chimes.

Estonia: Tradition dictates that the holiday should be celebrated with either seven, nine, or twelve meals during the day and you will have the strength of that many men or women during the coming year.

Philippines: Round shapes symbolize money, so people in the Philippines eat round foods, carry coins in their pockets, and wear clothing with lots of polka dots in the hopes of boosting their finances for the New Year.

Turkey: In Turkey (and also Italy, Spain, and Mexico) it is believed that red underwear at midnight on New Year's Eve will bring good luck in the coming year.

Brazil, Ecuador, Bolivia, and Venezuela: In these counties, underwear color is also important to the success in the following year. Red brings love, yellow brings money, green brings luck, and so on. Local markets display colored underpants for sale leading up to the New Year

Colombia: In order to ensure travel opportunities for the next year, Colombians celebrate the New Year by carrying an empty suitcase around the block.

Belgium and Romania: Farmers rise early on New Year's Day and promptly head out the stables to wish the cows and other livestock a happy New Year.

Finland: Finnish people melt tin horseshoes, pour the molten metal into cold water, and use the resulting solid to gain insight into the coming year. Its shape and shadow supposedly tell all.

Ecuador: In Ecuador, los años viejos (the old years) is a beloved part of how to celebrate the New Year. Families work together to construct large scarecrows of those they don't like and set them on fire at midnight in order to burn away the ills of last year. In Panama the scarecrow effigies are called muñecos, but they are stuffed with fireworks, making the burning of them a little more explosive.

Greece: An onion is traditionally hung on the front door of homes on New Year's Eve as a symbol of rebirth in the New Year. On New Year's Day, parents wake their children by tapping them on the head with the onion.

Moapa Valley to Host Community Resources Fair








