MINUTES OF THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING (CDAC) VOTING RECOMMENDATIONS

HELD AT THE CLARK COUNTY SOCIAL SERVICE BUILDING, ADMIN TRAINING ROOM, 3RD FLOOR, 1600 PINTO LANE, COUNTY OF CLARK, NEVADA, ON TUESDAY, March 4, 2025.

Opening Ceremonies

Mr. Christopher Lee, Chairperson, called the meeting to order and Geraldine Ramirez led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.

I. Public Comment – At this time, the Committee will hear comments from the public regarding items listed on the agenda as posted.

No public comments.

II. Roll Call

Roll Call was completed by Karen Michelin, Manager with Clark County Community Housing Office (CHO). Committee attendance was noted. Karen Michelin noted that a quorum was present.

III. Approve minutes for February 18, 2025, meeting. (For Possible Action)

Ms. Sondra Cosgrove made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 18, 2025, meeting. Another CDAC member seconded the motion, and the motion was approved.

IV. ACTION – Review, discuss, and vote on FY 2025-2026 HOME Investment Partnerships Program/Affordable Housing Trust Fund (HOME/AAHTF) projects for recommendation to the Board of County Commissioners (BCC).

Chairman Christopher Lee acknowledged that Giavonni Garcia, Grants Coordinator, would be providing the overview of the FY 2025-2026 HOME/AAHTF project scoring results. Ms. Garcia introduced the order of the projects in which they ranked based on the committee's scores. She also informed the CDAC to focus on the top seven applicants and when the monies are spent down, they can continue to rank the remainder of the applicants to fund other projects.

There was an increase from the original \$5.5 million to \$6 million based on funds that were still available, which gives the CDAC committee more funds to provide applicants with more projects.

The total request included nine applicants. The total request included Riverwood

Apartments at \$1,000,000; Arroyo Grande Apartments at \$1,000,000, Marble Manor Phase II A at \$1,500,000, Parvin Senior Apartments at \$1,500,000, Volunteer Apartments at \$1,800,000; Arthur McCants Manor at \$1,000,000; Nellis Grove Apartments at \$1,041,330; Kyle Canyon at \$1,000,000, and West Henderson Affordable Family Apartments at \$1,000,000.

Ms. Garcia initiated the deliberations, and Chairman Lee directed the Committee members to express their comments, questions, or concerns regarding the nine applications. The total funding requested for these applications amounted to \$10,841,330.

Discussion and deliberations ensued with the CDAC members making motions and approving the final recommendations for funding HOME/AAHTF projects 2025-2026, as follows:

The CDAC agreed to remove the following projects from FY 2025-2026 HOME/AAHTF:

- NPR Lone Star Development LLC- Parvin Senior-\$ 1,500,000 (project readiness)
- NPR Lone Star Development LLC- Kyle Canyon- \$1,000,000 (project readiness)

The CDAC has recommended five projects to be fully funded, which include Riverwood Apartments, Arroyo Grande Apartments, Marble Manor Phase II A, Arthur McCants Manor, and Nellis Grove Apartments as listed on the below HOME/AAHTF excel spreadsheet.

A motion was made to accept the recommendations as presented in the above spreadsheet. Motion was approved.

V. ACTION – Review, discuss, and vote on FY 2025-2026 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) projects for recommendation to the BCC.

Chairman Christopher Lee acknowledged that Kent Golangco, Grants Coordinator would be providing the overview of the FY 2025-2026 CDBG projects scoring results. Kent Golangco introduced the order of the projects in which they ranked based on the Administrative and the CDAC scores from highest to lowest.

Mr. Golangco explained that the committee would review applications in two categories: Public Service (PS) and Capital Improvement projects (CIP). He informed the CDAC committee that they would first evaluate the Public Service projects before moving on to the CIP and other projects.

CHO received \$6,210,712.45 in funding for CDBG projects, with up to 15% allocated for Public Service initiatives, while the remaining funds can be used for Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) and other endeavors. Mr. Golangco advised the committee that they should not feel obligated to utilize the full Public Service allocation for the listed projects. If the CDAC chooses not to fund certain Public Service projects, the unused funds can be redirected to CIPs. He clarified that the \$1,200,000 designated for Public Service projects represents the maximum available funding for those initiatives. He encouraged the CDAC to consider factors such as fiscal capacity, cost reasonableness, and project readiness when ranking or assigning points to each project, emphasizing the importance of thorough evaluation.

The Public Service applicants included Work Readiness Project requesting \$302,668; Teen Young Adult Independent Living Program requesting \$100,000; Pink Chair Outreach and Education Expansion Program requesting \$75,000; Chromebooks for Public Housing Residents requesting \$43,000; One Extended Family requesting \$1,062,500, The Owens Project requesting \$851,307; The Prosperity Project requesting \$200,000; and The Eritrean American Community of Las Vegas requesting \$100,000.

The CDAC was encouraged to engage in discussion and deliberation concerning the eight CDBG Public Service applicants for the FY 2025-2026 funding cycle, with a total funding request amounting to \$2,734,475.

Christopher Lee, Chair, urged the CDAC to rank CDBG recommendations for CIPs and other projects, noting they could revisit all proposals after deliberations. The committee agreed to evaluate CDBG CIPs first before finalizing funding. Mr. Lee acknowledged meeting adjustments, apologized, and praised the team's dedication and excellence.

The CIP and other projects included Torrey Pines Early Learning Village Project requesting \$2,340,339; One Extended Family requesting \$1,937,500; Boost and Build requesting \$440,000; The Owens Project requesting \$495,000; Harris Springs Ranch Solar Conversion Project requesting \$1,000,000; and Energy Efficient Initiative requesting \$100,792.

The CDAC was instructed to conduct discussions and deliberations regarding the six applicants for CDBG CIP and other projects for the FY 2025-2026 funding cycle, with a total funding request totaling \$6,313,631.

The following recommendations for CDBG projects were as follows:

The CDAC agreed to remove the following projects from both the Public Service and CIP FY 2025-2026 CDBG funding cycle:

- The Foundation Christian Center One Extended Family \$ 1,937,500 (cost reasonableness)
- The Restoration and Recovery Foundation The Owens Project \$495,000 (cost reasonableness)

The CDAC has recommended ten projects be fully funded, which include Work Readiness Program, Teen & Young Adult Independent Living Program, Pink Chair Outreach and Education Expansion Project, Chromebooks for Public Housing Residents, The Prosperty Project, Eritrean American Community of Las Vegas, Torrey Pines Early Learning Villages, Boost and Build, Harris Springs Ranch Solar Conversion, and Energy Efficient Initiative, as listed on the below CDBG excel spreadsheet.

The presentation included a breakdown of the funding categories. Ms. Ulmer displayed a chart with the funding recommendations as well as the funding contingency plan.
