EXPLANATION TO CLARK COUNTY TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT QUESTION

On June 19, 1990, the Board of County Commissioners adopted the "Fair Share Funding Program" which proposes to generate \$100 million annually in revenue dedicated to improve transportation. Revenue for this program would be generated from increased taxes on retail sales (¼%), motor vehicle privilege (Ic), motor vehicle fuel (a maximum increase of Ic in 1992, and an additional 4c implemented between 1993 and 1996 as projects warrant), aviation fuel (4c), hotel-motel room rental (1%), and new construction (\$500 per residential unit/50c per square foot of commercial development). Additional revenue is anticipated from Airport fees and existing state and federal sources. The "Fair Share Funtransportation program; industry and gaming 18%; 31% would be expected from state and federal sources; and residents would contribute approximately 21% of the total program.

A "YES" vote on this question would urge the 1991 Nevada Legislature to allow the County to generate new revenue in order to address critical traffic problems by constructing and improving beltways, streets, interchanges, intersections and transportation systems throughout the County.

A "NO" vote on this question would keep revenues dedicated to transportation improvements at current levels and not provide new revenue to be used to construct and improve beltways, streets, interchanges, intersections and transportation systems throughout the County.

NOTE: This question is purely advisory in nature and does not place any legal requirement on the governing body or any officer of the political subdivision.

ARGUMENTS FOR PASSAGE

Traffic congestion in Clark County is increasing daily and at times approaches gridlock, hurting our air quality and our economic future. Over the past decade, there have been severe cut-backs in federal and state funding for transportation on a nationwide basis, while in Clark County our tourist industry is booming and our population is growing. It is estimated that needed transportation projects in Clark County now exceed \$2 billion. Unless local revenue sources are developed to fund traffic relief, the present situation will only get worse. The Fair Share Funding Program will ensure that everyone who benefits from improved transportation will contribute a fair share of the cost.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST PASSAGE

The Fair Share Funding Program will increase certain taxes for tourists, developers, businesses, and local citizens, which could have a negative impact

on our economy. Any funding program for transportation should include property taxes. The proposed tax on construction may restrict the growth rate of new development. The federal and state governments should be responsible for paying the cost of transportation projects.
