DESERT CONSERVATION PROGRAM

The Desert Conservation Program (DCP) manages Endangered Species Act compliance on behalf of Clark County and the cities of Boulder City, Henderson, Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Mesquite and the Nevada Department of Transportation (NDOT) (collectively, the Permittees) through implementation of the Clark County Multiple Species Habitat Conservation Plan (MSHCP) and associated Section 10(a)(1)(B) incidental take permit. The MSHCP and permit allow private landowners to develop land in Clark County without the need for individual project-by-project consultations and negotiation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife (USFWS) to comply with the Endangered Species Act, providing a streamlined process for compliance. In exchange for this permit, the DCP implements actions to mitigate impacts from development. These actions include research, acquisition of sensitive habitats, habitat restoration, public information and education, the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line, and installation and maintenance of fencing along roadways to reduce tortoise mortality.

BOULDER CITY CONSERVATION EASEMENT (BCCE)

The incidental take permit requires the establishment of a conservation easement in the Eldorado Valley to be managed and protected for the benefit of the desert tortoise (*Gopherus agassizzi*) as partial mitigation for the take of desert tortoise and its habitat. The BCCE was established between Clark County and Boulder City in July of 1995 to fulfill this requirement.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Provided oversight and project management for the interlocal agreement with Boulder City for Law Enforcement on the BCCE.
- Conducted twenty-five site visits to monitor use, disturbances, and related issues; to perform new signage installation, maintenance and upgrades; for restoration planning and monitoring; and in support of the Predation Study and the Desert Tortoise Occupancy Study.
- Met with law enforcement during five site visits to plan patrols to cover areas where unauthorized uses were detected.
- Completed construction of three new gabion kiosks with signage at three common entry points to the BCCE. This project helps inform the public about the conservation easement and its purpose, things to see and do and the rules to be followed.

BOULDER CITY CONSERVATION EASEMENT— CONTINUED

- Met with representatives from Sempra Energy and Boulder City to discuss proposed energy development projects.
- Continued coordination with utility companies based in the Energy Zone in order to meet desert conservation and restoration goals.
- Mapping and assessment of unauthorized roads and other disturbances is ongoing and will guide prioritization of restoration activities on the BCCE.
- Baseline surveys for birds and small mammals on the BCCE are in the planning phase. Surveys will be conducted in spring of 2018.
- Baseline surveys for bats on both the BCCE and the riparian reserve units are in the planning phase. Surveys will be conducted in summer of 2018.

RIPARIAN RESERVE UNITS

The incidental take permit stipulates that take of covered avian species is conditioned upon the acquisition of private lands in desert riparian habitats along the Muddy and Virgin rivers and the Meadow Valley wash. To comply with this permit condition, the DCP has acquired properties with riparian habitat along the Virgin and Muddy rivers in Clark County. These properties serve to mitigate impacts to covered species and conserve habitats and important connectivity corridors.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

Muddy River Reserve Unit

- A request for quotes (RFQ) was sent to potential bidders for maintenance of the Muddy River Reserve Units. Eagle View Contractors was selected to conduct maintenance on the properties which will begin in January 2018.
- Planning efforts for the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act (SNPLMA) Round 16 project to conduct habitat restoration on the Muddy River Reserve Unit continue restoration а implementation plan has been prepared to prioritize restoration areas within the property including recommendations for native plant species selection, planting methods, source stock, etc.
- The National Park Service's Exotic Plant Management Team continues to conduct vegetation management and maintenance activities for enhancement of native riparian species.

Virgin River Reserve Unit

- Continued photo-monitoring documentation of restored areas within Subunit 1.
- Planning efforts for the SNPLMA Round 15 project to conduct 20 to 40 acres of habitat restoration on the Virgin River Reserve Unit continue; a restoration implementation plan has been prepared to prioritize restoration areas within the property, including recommendations for native plant species selection, planting methods, source stock, etc.
- An RFQ was sent to potential bidders for herbicide acquisition. Helena Chemical was selected.

- Great Basin Institute was selected to conduct restoration services on the Virgin River Reserve Units in 2018.
- Attended two workshops this quarter with other stakeholders to discuss preliminary planning of a Lower Virgin River Integrated Watershed Management Plan.
- Attended the Virgin River Conservation Partnership Symposium in Mesquite.

Property Acquisition

• The Board of County Commissioners approved the DCP's request to purchase previously identified properties of interest along the Virgin River in Bunkerville and Riverside, Nevada. One offer letter was sent to a property owner.

WILD DESERT TORTOISE ASSISTANCE ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line

The 1995 Desert Conservation Plan and the 2001 MSHCP require that the DCP provide a hotline and pick up service to deal with wild desert tortoises which are displaced by development or appear to be in harm's way due to construction activity. The DCP operates the wild desert tortoise assistance line to meet this requirement.

• No calls were received from the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line during this reporting period.

Desert Tortoise Fencing

• Continued planning activities for the construction of post-and-cable and desert tortoise fencing along the boundary of the newlydesignated Tule Springs Fossil Beds National Monument. Construction of this project is expected to begin in 2018. Completed a contract with HRA, Inc. to conduct cultural resource surveys of the project alignment in support of consultation with the State historic Preservation Office.

ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

As a requirement of the incidental take permit, the DCP is required to have an Adaptive Management Program (AMP) in order to gauge the effectiveness of existing conservation measures, propose alternative conservation measures as the need arises and to deal with changed or unforeseen circumstances.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Completed the 2018 Biennial Adaptive Management Report, available <u>online</u>.
- Attended meetings for the Desert Tortoise Recovery and Implementation Team and the Manager's Oversight Group.
- Performed health assessments on October 17th on tortoises removed from construction sites to prepare them for release in spring 2018.
- Attended meeting regarding obtaining LiDAR imaging for Clark County with contractor and Southern Nevada Water Authority on October 18th.
- Performed field telemetry on October 24th and 25th in coordination with drone project (1785A) to ground test results for data analysis.
- Held quarterly meeting with Science Advisor on November 7th where ongoing and future projects were discussed

Permit Amendment

The DCP continues to pursue a major amendment to the MSHCP and incidental take permit. This amendment would allow for additional take authorization in Clark County while providing long-term assurances to the Clark County community for continued economic growth.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Staff continues to meet with the USFWS to discuss issues related to the proposed amendment.
- Continued to administer a contract with Southwest Ecology, LLC to provide covered species analysis support. This contract will result in the development of up to 31 new species distribution models, review and assessment of 25 existing species distribution models, and development of species accounts for up to 56 species. Work under this contract will provide information necessary to support an analysis and revision of the covered species list and data necessary to conduct impact analyses to support an application for an amended MSHCP.
- Continued to administer a contract with Ebbin, Moser + Skaggs, LLP to provide legal counsel services in support of the permit amendment effort.
- Continued to administer a contract with WRA Environmental Consultants to assist with the preparation of documents and analyses that will support development of the MSHCP amendment. A kick-off meeting for this project was held this quarter and WRA has begun synthesizing data provided by Southwest Ecology to develop a final list of species proposed for coverage. Development of MSHCP Amendment chapters also continued this quarter.

- Administered a contract with Adaptation Insight to facilitate a climate change workshop. This workshop was attended by staff and consultants working on the permit amendment project. The workshop focused on providing training on the latest policies and practices for incorporating climate change analyses into a Habitat Conservation Plan application package.
- Staff continues to coordinate with Nevada Division of Forestry (NDF) to discuss development of a master permit for the take of state-listed plant species. This permit would provide the MSHCP Permittees with disturbance authorization from the State Forester Firewarden, in accordance with Nevada Revised Statutes, for state-listed plant species in Clark County.

External Agency Coordination and Assistance

In order to keep well informed on the current and future land use impacts to Clark County, the DCP will review and potentially provide comments on issues relevant to Clark County. As a public agency, the DCP also provides data as requested to interested parties.

- Participated on interview panels for the hiring of staff within the Department.
- Continue to participate as a cooperating agency to the Bureau of Land Management's (BLM's) Resource Management Plan revision process.

- Organized field trip with Nevada Conservation groups and provided map information on November 3rd.
- Provided GIS data to Nevada Conservation Lands Organization.
- Provided GIS data and maps to The Nature Conservancy.
- Provided GIS data and maps to the Friends of Nevada Wilderness.
- Provided maps to Save Red Rock Canyon organization.
- Provided GIS data and maps to USFWS.



ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Processed vendor payments 69 invoices: 64 accepted (93%), 5 rejected (7%).
- Fiscal Year (FY) 18 budgets and expenditures continue to be monitored regularly to ensure appropriate spending and reporting occur. Initiated process of developing FY18 estimates and FY19 budget.
- Phase 1 of converting all the existing credit card terminals to the new processor, Wells Fargo, has been completed. Phase 2 of converting the existing web and IVR systems has been completed. Phase 3 is in process to establish e-payment services for County departments that do not currently offer e-payments.
- Desert tortoise specialty license plate application was approved. Plate design template sent to Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) for approval. Awaiting next steps in the process for production of the plates.

- Oversight of the SNPLMA R8-R16 projects totaling \$7,733,015 continues in the County's financial system. The projects continue to be monitored for progress and reimbursement.
- Received reimbursement for SNPLMA projects: R15-1 draw downs (\$3,969.00), R16-1 draw downs (\$23,999.75).
- Completed the Biennial Progress Report, available <u>online</u>.
- DCP leadership attended training on Management Best Practices and Accelerating Change in the Regulated Community.
- Attended the National Habitat Conservation Planning Coalition annual conference.

DCP staff is responsible for ensuring that land disturbed pursuant to the MSHCP is accounted for and monies are collected and deposited in the Section 10 special reserve fund established under the MSHCP. 



