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#### DESERT CONSERVATION PROGRAM

The Desert Conservation Program (DCP) manages Endangered Species Act compliance on behalf of Clark County and the cities of Boulder City, Henderson, Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Mesquite and the Nevada Department of Transportation (NDOT) (collectively, the Permittees) through implementation of the Clark County Multiple Species Habitat Conservation Plan (MSHCP) and associated Section 10(a)(1)(B) incidental take permit. The MSHCP and permit allow private landowners to develop land in Clark County without the need for individual project-by-project consultations and negotiation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) to comply with the Endangered Species Act, providing a streamlined process for compliance. In exchange for this permit, the DCP implements actions to mitigate impacts from development. These actions include research, acquisition of sensitive habitats, habitat restoration, public information and education, the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line, and installation and maintenance of fencing along roadways to reduce tortoise mortality.

#### BOULDER CITY CONSERVATION EASEMENT (BCCE)

The incidental take permit requires the establishment of a conservation easement in the Eldorado Valley to be managed and protected for the benefit of the desert tortoise (*Gopherus agassizzi*) as partial mitigation for the take of desert tortoise and its habitat. The BCCE was established between Clark County and Boulder City in July of 1995 to fulfill this requirement.

#### ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Continued processing a request from the City of Boulder City for a modification to the BCCE and easement agreement. The Long Range Planning Committee has approved the request; the Board of County Commissioners will consider the boundary adjustment at an upcoming meeting.
- Provided oversight and project management for the interlocal agreement with Boulder City for Law Enforcement on the BCCE.
- Conducted eighteen site visits to monitor use, disturbances, and related issues; to perform new signage installation, maintenance and upgrades; and for restoration planning and monitoring.
- Met with law enforcement during five site visits to plan patrols to cover areas where unauthorized uses were detected.

- Handled infrastructure repair issues when they were detected on site visits. One sign that was stolen was replaced.
- Continued coordination with utility companies based in the Energy Zone in order to meet desert conservation and restoration goals.
- Mapping and assessment of unauthorized roads and other disturbances is ongoing and will guide prioritization of restoration activities on the BCCE.

#### RIPARIAN RESERVE UNITS

The incidental take permit stipulates that take of covered avian species is conditioned upon the acquisition of private lands in desert riparian habitats along the Muddy and Virgin rivers and the Meadow Valley wash. To comply with this permit condition, the DCP has acquired properties with riparian habitat along the Muddy and Virgin rivers in Clark County. These properties serve to mitigate impacts to covered species and conserve habitats and important connectivity corridors.

#### ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

#### **Muddy River Reserve Unit**

- Eagle View Contractors continues ongoing maintenance of the Muddy River Reserve Units.
- Planning efforts for the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act (SNPLMA) Round 16 project to conduct habitat restoration on the Muddy River Reserve Unit continue – a Request For Proposals (RFP) is currently being prepared to complete the restoration design.
- The National Park Service's (NPS) Exotic Plant Management Team continues to conduct vegetation management and maintenance activities for enhancement of native riparian species.
- Restoration implementation is ongoing for the SNPLMA Round 14 project to conduct habitat restoration. NPS' Exotic Plant Management Team has collected native species and is currently propagating at their nursery. The site will be prepared early 2019 and subsequently planted with the propagated plants.
- Monthly data collection on groundwater monitoring wells continues.

#### **Virgin River Reserve Unit**

- Continued photo-monitoring documentation of restored areas within Subunit 1.
- Planning efforts continue for the SNPLMA Round 15
  project to conduct 20 to 40 acres of habitat restoration
  on the Virgin River Reserve Unit. An Interlocal Agreement was approved November 6th for Nevada Division
  of Forestry (NDF) to masticate tamarisk on the Mormon
  Mesa and Riverside subunits. NDF has masticated 4
  acres to date.
- Attended a workshop this quarter with other stakeholders to discuss preliminary planning of a Lower Virgin River Integrated Watershed Management Plan.
- Attended the TARA beetle workshop hosted by Rivers Edge West in St George, Utah.

- Participated in the Virgin River Collation Steering Committee meeting.
- NPS' Exotic Plant Management Team continues to conduct vegetation management and maintenance activities for enhancement of native riparian species.
- Conducted pre-restoration vegetation monitoring at the Mormon Mesa so that the effectiveness of future restoration actions can be evaluated.

#### **Property Acquisition**

• Continued coordination with Public Works Map Team to subdivide parcels identified for future acquisition.

#### WILD DESERT TORTOISE ASSISTANCE

#### **ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER**

#### **Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line**

The 1995 Desert Conservation Plan and the 2001 MSHCP require that the DCP provide a hotline and pick up service to deal with wild desert tortoises which are displaced by development or appear to be in harm's way due to construction activity. The DCP operates the wild desert tortoise assistance line to meet this requirement.

No calls were received from the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line during this reporting period.

#### **Desert Tortoise Fencing**

• Continued planning activities for the construction of post-and-cable and desert tortoise fencing along the boundary of the Tule Springs Fossil Beds National Monument. This project will go out for bid once the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has completed their cadastral survey of the monument.

#### OTHER WORK

#### **ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER**

• Through an Interlocal Agreement with the Nevada Division of Minerals, 18 bat compatible closures were installed on abandoned mine land hazards in the Gold Butte area. These closures will ensure public safety while retaining the value of the associated wildlife habitat. Additional bat compatible closures will be installed at suitable locations in the coming quarters.

#### ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

As a requirement of the incidental take permit, the DCP is required to have an Adaptive Management Program (AMP) in order to gauge the effectiveness of existing conservation measures, propose alternative conservation measures as the need arises and to deal with changed or unforeseen circumstances.

#### **ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER**

- Held the Quarterly Science advisor meetings to discuss current and future projects on November 6th.
- Attended the USFWS northeast Mojave Recovery Implementation Team meeting on November 7th.
- Met with USFWS in Nevada and California to discuss a large project to look at tortoise crossings of linear rights-of-way on December 18th.
- Started a project for Desert Tortoise Telemetry and Health Assessments on the BCCE with the Great Basin Institute.

#### Permit Amendment

The DCP continues to pursue a major amendment to the MSHCP and incidental take permit. This amendment would allow for additional take authorization in Clark County while providing long-term assurances to the Clark County community for continued economic growth.

#### **ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER**

- Continued to coordinate with the USFWS to discuss issues related to the proposed amendment.
- Continue to work with Permittees on federal legislation that will support efforts to obtain an amended MSHCP; continue to coordinate with elected officials and other stakeholders on the development of the County lands bill; continued to meet monthly with the OHV Advisory Committee to discuss including protections for OHV recreation areas in the lands bill.
- Continue to administer a contract with Ebbin, Moser + Skaggs, LLP to provide legal counsel services in support of the permit amendment effort.
- Continued to administer a contract with WRA Environmental Consultants to assist with the preparation of documents and analyses that will support development of the MSHCP amendment. This quarter, the consultants continued developing methods for a habitat functionality analysis that will be used in conducting impact analyses to support the County's application for an amended incidental take permit.
- Reached an agreement with the NDF to secure a County-wide permit for potential impacts to state-listed plants. Currently securing all necessary signatures to fully execute the permit.

#### External Agency Coordination and Assistance

In order to keep well informed on the current and future land use impacts to Clark County, the DCP will review and potentially provide comments on issues relevant to Clark County. As a public agency, the DCP also provides data as requested to interested parties.

#### **ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER**

- Provided NDF with GIS data and maps of state-listed plants.
- Provided maps to environmental consultant Newfields, Inc.
- Provided GIS data and maps to the City of Mesquite, NV.



# ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Processed vendor payments 58 invoices: 57 accepted (98%), 1 rejected (2%).
- Fiscal Year (FY) 19 Budgets and expenditures continue to be monitored regularly to ensure appropriate spending and reporting occur. Initiated process of developing FY19 estimates and FY20 budget.
- Phase 1 of converting all the existing credit card terminals to the new processor, Wells Fargo, has been completed. Phase 2 of converting the existing web and IVR systems has been completed. Phase 3 is in process to establish e-payments services for County departments that did not currently offer e-payments.
- Desert tortoise specialty license plate production is ongoing and plates are being distributed at Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles (DMVs).
- Oversight of the SNPLMA Round 8 Round 16 projects totaling \$7,733,015 continues in the County's financial system. The projects continue to be monitored for progress and reimbursement.
- Received reimbursement for SNPLMA projects: Round 15 - 1 draw down (\$2,334.00), Round 16 - 1 draw down (\$13,000.00).
- Completed the 2019 2021 Implementation Plan and Budget. The Board of County Commissioners approved the plan at their December 18<sup>th</sup> meeting. A copy of the report may be viewed here.

DCP staff is responsible for ensuring that land disturbed pursuant to the MSHCP is accounted for and monies are collected and deposited in the Section 10 special reserve fund established under the MSHCP. 


