## Highlights of the Year

Added 40 supplemental positions which included the creation of a 5<sup>th</sup> battalion.

Completed two of the largest recruit academies in department history with a total of 129 graduating firefighters.

Activated Clark County Multi-Agency Coordination Center (MACC) supporting Mt. Charleston Flooding, Formula 1, NYE, and UNLV Shooting Incident.

Deployed NVTf-1 providing aid from the deadly wildfires in Maui.

Several new frontline units were put in service: EMS33, E215, E30, R215, R223 and R66.

Secured over \$23 million of supplemental reimbursement payments through the Ground Emergency Medical Transport (GEMT) Program.
