Billy Samuels

Chief Samuels: We had a little mishap when it comes to the funding sizes (UNINTELLIGIBLE). And the thing would be placed on Stephanie Daus that was supposed to report out for us on LEPC. We had them mixed up. I cannot call an audible and pull those through. So I will table this, the Nevada Energy Talks for the first order of next meeting of LEPC, to get a report on what those actually look like.

So I do apologize for that. (UNINTELLIGIBLE). I'm not going to go out of form on that.

VI. LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS

- a. Plans Administration Subcommittee Carlito Rayos, Chair

Carlito Rayos: Morning Chief, morning everybody. So Chief as you know the grant we had submitted to SERC to send responders to the Special Emergency Response Training Center in Boulder, Colorado to obtain their hazmat technician level certification has been officially denied from SERC and (UNINTELLIGIBLE). We're currently looking for ideas or options for those new cycle (UNINTELLIGIBLE) funds that are available. I think there is upwards of \$400,000.00 there and there is no deadline per se, I think it was fiscal year, so next October. So if anybody has any potential ideas for that. Ones were kind of floating around, Chief you and I had talked a long time about doing electrical vehicle or lithium ion here, but we really wanted it to be hands on in the task level, so we're still working through that. I know that Chief Arboreen had submitted a potential class, I think that was more lecture, if I'm not mistaken. Chief Arboreen you can correct me if I'm wrong and then Chief (UNINTELLIGIBLE) and I are looking at a strategic incident command class from ChemTrek, that we had (UNINTELLIGIBLE) that Chief (UNINTELLIGIBLE), Chief Arboreen and I got to sit in that class down in New Orleans at the ChemTrek conference and think that it would provide tremendous value to the valley. So I think Chief (UNINTELLIGIBLE) you and I are going to see the pilot in Houston if he thinks that it's good for our operations and (UNINTELLIGIBLE), we would probably be writing the grant to propose that. One last thing, we are getting our annual reports together, so we might be reaching to folks asking them for help. We owe a list of documents to the state coming up shortly.

Chief Samuels: Do you have a timeframe, Carlito, on those documents that are expected to be in the state's hands?

Carlito Rayos: Andria is the project officer on that. Andria do you what the deadline is for that? Is it the first of the year?

Andria: For the annual submission?

Carlito Rayos: Yes.

Andria: It is actually January 31st as far as I remember.

Carlito Rayos: Yeah, that's what it is, which I always find odd that it's the end of the first month of the year. I think I have the next one too, sir.

Andria: Chief your mic is muted.

Chief Samuels: Chief Arboreen do you have any insight on that the (UNINTELLIGIBLE) class that Carlito was referring to? Is it lecture only or is there a hands on component as well?

Chief Arboreen: My understanding, and I'll have to take a better look at that, but I think it was the same instruction and delivery that we received in Baltimore. I don't believe there was any additional practical application, but I'll double check and check back in and follow-up with you (UNINTELLIGIBLE).

Chief Samuels: Thanks, Chief. And Carlito is it more possible to get that class here if it's hands on or can we do just lecture only?

Carlito Rayos: I think we try going along with what Chief Arboreen is proposing, at least to get you know just the classroom portion and better understanding of the

situation awareness in the valley and what we're looking at. You and I talked to those guys from FDNY when we were in Baltimore and they're fighting 5 or 6 electric car fires a day. So they're coming up with tactics and techniques and strategies as they go along. That other group that we...I can't think of what it's called, it's like 3 alarm emergencies that the battery class that we sat in in Baltimore, they had more of a hands on application. So I think maybe if we start with what Chief Arboreen is proposing and then look at another cycle to bring that one in for the hands on. I think that would give us all a good learning experience.

Chief Samuels: Yeah, I appreciate that and they were good classes. I know that I will never get into an elevator with an electric battery like a computer or a hover board. That just turns all bad, so (UNINTELLIGIBLE), your PSA today, do not get in an elevator with ionized batteries or lithium.

b. Training and Exercise Subcommittee

Carlito Rayos, Chair
Misty Richardson, Co-chair

Carlito Rayos: Just that we're working on preparing those annual reports, Chief. And the other thing is I wanted to plug Blue Diamond Industrial working group for their work at LEPC and that training video that came out of that, Chief, I know you had a chance to look at it. I'd like to maybe if we can send that out to the membership so they can see. I think it's a great example. It's from a full scale exercise that we did back in the summer involving North Las Vegas, the City of Las Vegas and Clark County Fire Department that went from initial response all the way through (UNINTELLIGIBLE) activation and public notifications using our early notification system and specialties that include hazmat and tech rescue is a pretty big undertaking. We were fortunate LEPC has a huge production company here that actually produced all of their training videos for LEPC North America here in Las Vegas and awesome technology and editors and so they make a class of training videos. I mean it's specific to ammonia, but it highlights what everybody's role would be in a large scale...a large hazmat release and what the impact for off-site consequences would be and how do we mitigate those.

Chief Samuels: Yeah, Carlito, I have no problems getting that out to this group. They've all been very good about when things pop up to send this to LEPC Committee. So LEPC is good with that to share that video presentation, send it to Andria and she will disseminate that. And I agree, it doesn't matter what product is it, the way that presentation was and (UNINTELLIGIBLE) had and then the integration of responders is a really good video. I think it pertains to what we all should be doing (UNINTELLIGIBLE). Alright, anything else, Carlito?

Carlito Rayos: I think I come up a little bit later in the Agenda, Sir. That's all I have for those points.

Chief Samuels: Alright, perfect thank you.

c. Grants Subcommittee

Pamela Hatty, Chair

Pamela Hatty: Good morning. Nothing to report.

d. Public Information Subcommittee

Cheryl Nagy, Chair

Cheryl Nagy: Good morning everybody, Cheryl Nagy for the record. Just want to report out that the shake out for this year happened a couple of weeks ago. It was a success. Based on numbers from last year, statewide we went up in 45,000 participants. Clark County alone carried the bulk at 416,000 participants, so I want to thank everybody who participated in that. The other thing that I am going to drop into the chat is a link to the new preparedness flyer that we have with all jurisdictions on it for the Southern Nevada Community Preparedness app and Code Red Alerts for those of you doing outreach, it is proved to be something that people are actually looking at and utilizes our (UNINTELLIGIBLE) codes on there and new link. So I'm

going to drop that into the chat. And John Turner is my Vice Chair, I'm going to call him out and see if he's got anything going on for our committee on his side.

John Turner: I don't know if you can hear me or not, my phone's been (UNINTELLIGIBLE) muted, but nothing to report at this time, Cheryl.

Cheryl Nagy: Thank you John. And we're good too.

e. Legislative Subcommittee Angeline Szymanski, Chair

Angeline Szymanski: Okay, I think I figured out the trick with this. So we have our Nevada Legislative session, I think that will be right around when we meet next in February. There are 5 bill draft resolutions for (UNINTELLIGIBLE) in the area of emergency management. Most are from the office of the military from the state emergency management. Looking on the federal side, the (UNINTELLIGIBLE) Act which was originally Bill 2293, this would give USERA, Uniform Services Employment and Re-employment Rights Act for FEMA reservists who deploy. Previously if you were a FEMA reservist, you would not have those job protections if you were deployed. They did extend that to FEMA reservists now. In addition 4205, I mentioned this at our last meeting that FEMA was directed to establish a working group relating to the practices for animals in emergencies and disasters. That was passed and made into law on October 17th. Everything else is still sitting in both houses or in committees, so I'm not reporting on that. If there is anything else you'd like me to add, just feel free to email me everyone, but does anyone have any questions for me right now?

Chief Samuels: Angeline you talked about the (UNINTELLIGIBLE) working group for animals, is that something that you have expectations for us to do, or is that something that they're going to do on the federal level?

Angeline Szymanski: From my understanding they will put out those practices for us and then we just get the information to follow-up with them.

Chief Samuels: We appreciate that. Does anyone have any questions for Angeline?

f. GIS Subcommittee Sarah Wright, Chair

g. Specialized Response Subcommittee Vacant, Chair

Chief Samuels: Carlito are you still in this role or are we going to have City Fire do this again, or what's our plan on this?

Carlito Rayos: You know sir, I think it's probably easiest for me I think on the natural touch point for all of the different jurisdictions. So they share their information with me and I think I probably have the greatest situational awareness across the valley. Otherwise Arboreen asked me where (UNINTELLIGIBLE) training calendar and vice versa, which is a lot.

Chief Samuels: Go ahead if you have anything to report on.

Carlito Rayos: Yes sir, quite a bit and some of this probably could have gone in training, but I organized it all underneath special response. So I'm regularly working with Chief Arboreen as usual and now Chief (UNINTELLIGIBLE) who has come on board to replace Chief Cooper and Battalion Chief Wright in North Las Vegas is now filling this special operations role. So we're talking to each other on a regular basis. We're providing each other (UNINTELLIGIBLE) training and you know working through some issues, trying to standardize....our focus right now is really trying to standardize emergency response plans that are required for my Nevada Division of Environmental Protection underneath the chemical accident prevention program for Tier 2 facilities. So you those all look very different, much like the emergency response plans for the casinos before October 1st. Some were 2 pages, some were 400 pages. So we're trying to figure out how do we standardize that, what do we actually want to glean from the organizations that have chemicals or reportable

chemicals at reportable quantities and then how do we streamline that so they can easily be turned into preplanning efforts for the actual first, second and third (UNINTELLIGIBLE) units that will be arriving at these facilities. So we're continuing to do our tour series. We have 2 tomorrow as you know Chief, Apex power plant and Amazon, I'm not sure which one. It seems like there's a hundred of them out there, but it's one of the Amazon facilities in North Las Vegas. All of the first (UNINTELLIGIBLE) whether it's the County or North Las Vegas as well as (UNINTELLIGIBLE), you are all invited to those. Chief Arboreen and (UNINTELLIGIBLE) have had that successful tour series for some time, I think in the last couple of weeks there's been tours at Saguro Power Plant and Alfred Merritt Smith Water Treatment Facility, so we continue to be a success there. I think that'll lend itself to that standardization of those emergency response plans. RTC has a full scale exercise tomorrow. Does Joe or somebody want to talk about that briefly? Robert, I'm sorry are you part of that exercise effort tomorrow?

Robert: Yes, actually I'm going to be one of the players along. So they gotta keep me in the dark a little bit, but it's with the FTA, the DHS is also coming in. It's called their access. From what I do know, the information at this time is limited, but it's going to be impacting transit; it will be on a fairly large scale, but not too large where it's so complex that it wouldn't be able to be achieved in the timeframe for tomorrow. In our preliminary report is it is going to have something to do with the super bowl. That's what is going around and that is coming I believe in 24 or 25. So that is the information that I've been given so far.

Carlito Rayos: Alright, I appreciate that. One thing I have on my to do list is to get with RTC (UNINTELLIGIBLE) and then also a refresher on the first natural gas buses and the keys that are needed to shut that system down. I've been working with, I just drew a blank.

Male Voice: Judy is our manager of operations were and then we (UNINTELLIGIBLE) and we're looking nationally as far as hydrogen just because we are looking at possibly either doing a hydrogen production facility which brings up some other concerns based on power requirements, but yes we are doing a pilot program starting this upcoming year. I believe we will have 4 or 5 buses within the next fiscal year.

Carlito Rayos: Yeah, I'd really like to get all the crews and RTC touches everybody's jurisdiction, so maybe we can set something up similar to what Southwest Gas does with (UNINTELLIGIBLE) everybody gets to come look at the vehicles.

Male Voice: Absolutely, we can set something up with our fuel (UNINTELLIGIBLE) from North Las Vegas (UNINTELLIGIBLE) and Clark County at our facility down south.

Carlito Rayos: Fantastic. Thank you sir. Chief, if you hadn't heard, we're going to be doing a tech rescue, urban search and rescue exercise on the 19th and 20th of November at one of the Fiesta facilities, that's kind of DBD right to figure out. As we know more about that, we will make sure that we share that information with everybody. Dustin (UNINTELLIGIBLE) from Las Vegas Fire & Rescue, the new training officer for special operations sent me 2 training opportunities for MERRT, is the Modular Emergency Response Radiological Transportation training. It is DOE funded. This course is 2 days and there are no pre-requisites. It is coming up December 7th and 8th and then they have a team MERRT which is at the technician level. This class is an 8 hour class. There are 3 evolutions of it so all platoons can attend December 12th, 14th and 15th. We can make sure we get all of this information out to you along with that training video that I discussed earlier. And last but not least, Southern Nevada Health District is doing hazardous materials focus functional exercise, the first one of 2023 is going to be on January 25th, 2023. Clark County is obviously is participating, Las Vegas Fire & Rescue is participating. The epicenter for the incident, the release, will be downtown Las Vegas and it will impact both Las Vegas Paiute Nation as well as downtown bordering North Las Vegas and the City of

Las Vegas. It will have a rail component involved, so there's an opportunity there. There are some vulnerable populations in that area that you cannot just tell to evacuate really quickly. You can imagine if you can picture the area, there's a lot of (UNINTELLIGIBLE) challenges in that area that may not just have mobility to move a mile to the east or west to get out of the hazardous materials cloud. So look for that. That is an ongoing process. Is anybody from SNHD would be willing to talk about that at all?

Misty Richardson: I don't really have anything to add, I think you guys are doing most of the planning, so we just look forward to the exercise.

Carlito Rayos: Thank you Misty. Chief that's all I got.

Female Voice: Date on the exercise again?

Carlito Rayos: 25th of January, 2023.

Chief Samuels: And more will be coming on that. Carlito is working with Todd, (UNINTELLIGIBLE). And it will come (UNINTELLIGIBLE). I'm sure to Las Vegas OEM and then North Town OEM/Fire Department for all of those (UNINTELLIGIBLE) jurisdictions, so looking forward to it, it's going to be great. Thanks, Carlito.

Brian Arboreen: Carlito this is Brian, do you care if I add to either of that list that you just put out there?

Carlito Rayos: Please, go ahead.

Brian Arboreen: Okay, the date of November 15th, Las Vegas Fire is also hosting a (UNINTELLIGIBLE) lead sampling and product ID. This is for all (UNINTELLIGIBLE) and there is a joint exercise, actually a joint training session that both Henderson Hazmat and Las Vegas Fire Hazmat will be attending as well as LVMPD armor. And then again I won't steal it from (UNINTELLIGIBLE), but he will probably go into our (UNINTELLIGIBLE) annual exercise that is in 2 days on November 10th down at Foreman special materials.

Carlito Rayos: Hey Chief Arboreen, do you have any information on the trans care, the chlorine training that they are bringing to the valley that doesn't (UNINTELLIGIBLE) to the valley? I couldn't find any (UNINTELLIGIBLE). Do you know the dates on that?

Brian Arboreen: I don't. I heard that all in conversation. I haven't heard any confirmation on the dates or times.

Carlito Rayos: Okay, we'll present that (UNINTELLIGIBLE). That's that really cool program where chlorine brings railcars. Three of the railcars are classrooms and then they have several cars that are trainers so they can simulate a chlorine release on rails which obviously we have had concern about over the years, so that's a great training and it'll be multi-jurisdictional and focused on special response.

Chief Samuels: Great thank you. Good report Carlito.

SPECIAL REPORTS & WORKING GROUPS

- a. Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) Brian Ostaszewski,
Nevada State VOAD

Chief Samuels: We start with A. Brian Ostaszewski, he is the new President of Nevada State VOAD and can you give a report out please.

Brian Ostaszewski: Chief, good morning everybody, I'm honored to be part of the group. My name is Pastor Brian Ostaszewski, I am the new VOAD chair for the State

of Nevada and I am here to bring you new life and new direction into the organization. We have our first meeting scheduled for December 6th and we are gainfully working on improving our membership and trying to single out exactly who would be the most appropriate members of VOAD, so that way in times of need we would have all that we need, but it's going to be an effort, (UNINTELLIGIBLE) as in the past.

Chair Samuels: Thank you Brian. If you could, could you please share your contact information in the (UNINTELLIGIBLE) if possible. Then a lot of this groups on this year participate in VOAD. If they probably have any questions, they can reach out to you.

Brian Ostaszewski: Alright, I (UNINTELLIGIBLE) post both my cell number as well as my email address for you guys.

Chair Samuels: Alright, thank you and welcome to LEPC.

Brain Ostaszewski: Thank you.

Chair Samuels: Does anyone have any questions for Brian? Alright hearing none.

- b. Nuclear Waste Division Yucca Mountain Update Phil Klevatorick,
Clark County Nuclear Waste

Phil Klevatorick: First of all I'm so mesmerized by Carlito's mustache, I've sent him an email to invite him to breakfast so I can actually touch it (LAUGHING). Anyhow, good seeing you all. So first of all the State of Nevada interestingly filed a request to reopen the Yucca Mountain review process and they're doing it strategically cause they know that none of the participants have any money and there is no desire by the Department of Energy to move forward at this time and they haven't had any desire to move forward in the last several years, probably 8 to 10 years, so I think they're doing it strategically in order to try to push a closure to the process. That doesn't mean it will, but I just wanted to give everybody an update on that. I think the biggest thing that is going to come out and it is going to impact both to this group particularly our first responders is the announcement that the depleting uranium that is coming out of the east coast is destined to be shipped to one of 3 locations in the United States. One of which the Department of Energy owns and the other 2 they don't own, which means they have to pay for disposal. So you could probably imagine that the depleting uranium probably more than likely will end up in Southern Nevada or in Nye County to be exact, and we're looking at thousands of shipments for that. And it may be a couple of years away. I'm trying to get more information on it. The announcement came out sometime in the summer and anybody out here that works for the federal government, I apologize in that because I'm going to insult you—nothing works at the speed of government when it comes to the feds unless it is actually in their own vested interest; and I'm not sure if that's a vested interest to have that information met with Chief and other people who are going to potentially on the road, pathways and transportation routes. So once I get more information; and even if it's prior to the next LEPC meeting or another LEPC meeting in the future, I plan to share it with the Chief and we'll probably have a little get together with all the potential impacted communities along the projected routes. That's it for me. Thank you.

Chief Samuels: Thanks Phil, good report. Yeah, keep us posted on the timeframe so we can start (UNINTELLIGIBLE) our responders in our community to (UNINTELLIGIBLE).

Phil Klevatorick: And as you guys know, they do a significant amount of wonderful radiation training up at the Test Site and we all benefit from that, so thank you all.

- c. Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Josie Ross, Chair
Steering Subcommittee

Madison: Morning. This is Madison (UNINTELLIGIBLE) with the City of Henderson Emergency Management. Josie is out of the office today, but she will be back in tomorrow, so feel free to shoot her any questions then. Thank you.

Chief Samuels: Madison by chance did she give you any talking points on where we are at with the multi-jurisdictional hazard mitigation plan?

Madison: No she did not. I'm sorry.

Misty Richardson: So I did want to just give a brief update on that. I have a meeting today, our bi-weekly meeting that we have with consultants. And the plan is coming along nicely. So the project end date is September 1, so we're on track with everything at this point.

Chief Samuels: No anticipation of (UNINTELLIGIBLE) extension on that correct?

Misty Richardson: Extension on that? We're following project timeline, so there's no need for an extension I don't think at this point.

Chief Samuels: Perfect. That's what I like to hear, you know that.

Misty Richardson: I know.

Carlito Rayos: Right now we don't have official co-chairs for the Apex industrial working group. We have had conversations with Liz Strasberg and Holly and Energy Partners, we think that they would be a fantastic (UNINTELLIGIBLE) of air as well as CCSD food production, both of these facilities are Tier 2 facilities under the CAT program and have been tremendous leaders in that region already, so we'll look to solidify that. We've recently had the pleasure of having the conversation with Holly at Energy Partners. As you know, Chief, we got one of the (UNINTELLIGIBLE) from this late night emails. We understand that everybody's mission is priority A, but if everything is a priority, nothing is a priority, right, and there is a true shortage of diesel fuel, how are we going to rack and stack the needs for that. So we're just trying to prime that conversation before we actually need to have it. One other thing I wanted to bring up too, Chief I forgot in special response, is that the potential issues with paving over utilizes and critical infrastructure access is for the (UNINTELLIGIBLE) of coming (UNINTELLIGIBLE), right. We just have to launch on Saturday and that was just a small portion of the track and that was less than a mile, and the full track is like 2.5 miles. So you can image how many utilities are impacted. I've had some conversation with Corey Ross of the Water District, but I know that Angeline has some concerns. I image that Century Link will have some concerns, so I am meeting with Terry Miller from F1 tomorrow and I think what we should probably look to do is prioritize (UNINTELLIGIBLE) of those access points, and so they can have an

understanding of what the actual impacts would be. Cause they're looking at it obviously from an entertainment standpoint. We need to provide them the (UNINTELLIGIBLE) for them, the critical infrastructures that will work for them. So Chief by the next meeting we'll have co-chairs locked in for air, Mike Shanks, continues to be a champion and he's doing tremendous work in the Blue Diamond Enterprise Industrial Region. We really need somebody; there's only 2 tier facilities in the southwest part of town and they are both owned by NV Energy. I know Kim is working like 7 positions right now and Stephanie as well. But if we can get some representation from there. We really need that, cause again this exists for Tier 2 and they own both of them, so we really need NV Energy on the table for BEIR and I'll get with Kim on that. Pepsi is also in BEIR and they're doing great work. The Union Pacific Railroad is a great partner. There is some really big industry out there and we'd like to organize that and get that up and running like we have in other regions. Brian Pearson, are you on sir? Brian is the facility manager for Reddy Ice, he's a great partner, as you know Chief, we've got a great partner through COVID. he's going to look to twist some arms over at U.S. Foods and his buddies over there as well as Anderson Dairy and get them to the table. Harriett Parker continues to be a champion for us and (UNINTELLIGIBLE) as well. I think now it comes more to light after the exercise the first part of January 2023 as we look ahead at that area what those challenges would look like and what level of coordination would be necessary to survive an incident like that. And then I'll turn it over to our 2 All-stars, over at CAER, Jossie and Gil.

Gil: Real quick, we have completed 9 of the site visits for Henderson Fire Hazmat and our members. We have 2 scheduled remaining here and 2 that we need to schedule—one of which we have conformation with the folks that run that facility and we can get that scheduled soon. One of them is still working at Spring (UNINTELLIGIBLE) which I'm pretty confident we'll make happen. As Chief Arboreen mentioned, we have our CAER exercise scheduled at Gorman this Thursday. Then (UNINTELLIGIBLE) should be a great exercise, I appreciate everyone's help. Carlito, I outreached to BEIR to see if they needed any assistance with anything or any help structuring. We do have a rail yard you know down there that UP owns that does contain (UNINTELLIGIBLE) agents and I do have some interest in that. That group is willing to help out as needed. And we've met with several non-industry neighbors bordering the BMI facility, just trying to help them understand what they have in their ERP's or (UNINTELLIGIBLE) ERP related to chemicals mainly from toxic gases from the industry members in CAER's. That's all I got to report for now. Thanks.

Mike Shanks: This is my chance just starting in the BEIR Group, I really appreciate your help, Gil, we're going to lean on you quite a bit. So hope to see you on Thursday.

Gil: Thanks Mike.

Chief Samuels: This is Billy again. I appreciate all you guys co-chairing all these groups. These are super important and I like the way the quadrants are broken out. It makes more operational sense for everybody. Brian I see you came on, you're having mic problems, and that's okay. You're good now.

Male Voice: Anderson Dairy and U.S. Foods this week. I got a contact with each and should be getting them involved; and I'm excited to hear about the one downtown near Paiute, cause that's going to be me too up in that area.

Chief Samuels: (UNINTELLIGIBLE) that's the important part of LEPC, so I do appreciate that as well. Anybody have any questions for any of those regional working groups? If they are in your area, please make sure you guys reach out to your groups or quadrants, your co-chairs and schedule those (UNINTELLIGIBLE) or at least to have that point of contact for the early morning calls. So again I appreciate that. Spencer do you have a question?

Spencer Lewis: I was just going to bring up, here in Mesquite we do have industry coming in; I'll get with Carlito and try to get some (UNINTELLIGIBLE) on this, but we're going to have....if I remember the numbers right, there are 3 different acids being stored

on site here, in the thousand gallon range, (UNINTELLIGIBLE), so I want to get with Carlito to know how to map out some of those hazmat plans. As you know, we're a limited department. We're trying to beef up hazmat response, so I'll just kind of reach out to those guys. Carlito if you can point me in the right direction who I should talk with and help with that, that would be awesome, thank you.

Carlito Rayos: I'd be happy to sir.
